

DEAN: Dillon J. Swanson

Dillon J. Swanson is an organ performance major at Concordia College while also serving as the Chapel Organist for the campus' Office of Ministry. He joined the chapter in 2017 and has served as Sub-Dean since July 2020 and chairman of the Diamond Anniversary Committee since November of 2019.

Swanson has served as organist and music director in many churches in North Dakota, South Dakota, and Minnesota. His current appointments include Concordia College and Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, both in Moorhead, Minnesota. He will also serve as Organ Fellow for the 40th Session of Lutheran Summer Music Academy and Festival this summer at Valparaiso University in Valparaiso, Indiana under the mentorship of Chad Fothergill.

Dillon is active in the Red River Theatre Organ Society, currently serving as President as well as one of the current House Organists at the Fargo Theatre on the Mighty Wurlitzer.

Dillon Swanson is also an avid musicological research with current interests in J. S. Bach's *Clavier-Übung III*. He also a published author in the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians' magazine *CrossAccent*. His primary teachers have been Dr. Peggy Johnson, Andrew Steinberg, with special mentorship from Dr. Annett Richter and Chad Fothergill.



SUB-DEAN: Andrew Steinberg

Andrew Steinberg is the organ instructor, conductor of Symphonia, and choral area accompanist for Concordia College and the sanctuary worship director and organist at Trinity Lutheran Church, Moorhead. He is frequently called on as a soloist as well as a collaborative accompanist in instrumental and choral activities featuring organ, harpsichord, and piano and as musical director for a variety of music theatre experiences across the country including Concordia Theatre. At Concordia, Steinberg coaches singers into creating their own musical theatre cabaret shows, exploring the world of musical theatre literature, and preparing performers for professional experiences.

Steinberg has served as organist and worship director at congregations in the Twin Cities, Fort Collins, and the Fargo-Moorhead area. Steinberg coaches and accompanies soloists and ensembles throughout the region and nationally. He performed as solo organists in Wittenberg Germany, as part of the celebration of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, and has performed across the United States, Germany, and Scotland (University of Glasgow). Steinberg holds a master's degree in organ performance and certification in liturgical studies from Colorado State University, Fort Collins. He remains active as organist, collaborative pianists, vocal coach, and musical director for Concordia College's theatre program. Steinberg has earned credits toward a doctorate in collaborative piano. His primary teachers have been Peter Nygarrd, Dr. Joel Bacon, and Dr. Tyler Wottrich.



SECRETARY: Bradley Steen

Bradley J. Steen, Secretary of the Red River Valley Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, is Cathedral Organist at St. Mary's Cathedral in Fargo, ND, a position he has held since May 2017. He has also served as an organist, pianist, and accompanist at Sts. Anne & Joachim Catholic Church in Fargo since January 1996. He has been a ringer in the hand bell choir during part of his tenure there.

Bradley is originally from Fergus Falls, MN where he graduated from Fergus Falls High School. He is a graduate of Minnesota State University Moorhead where he received a BA degree in History and Music. He retired from North Dakota State University in November of 2014 after being employed at the NDSU Bookstore for thirty-seven years.

He is a member of the American Guild of Organists where he has held various offices in the Red River Valley Chapter through the years, the Red River Theatre Organ Society, and the Knights of Columbus.

Bradley enjoys reading, listening to music, viewing classic television and cinema, and has an avocational interest in architecture, church history, and transportation history including automobiles, trains, ships, and airplanes.



TREASURER: Alex P. Swanson

Alex Swanson works as a funeral director at West Funeral Home in West Fargo. He joined the chapter in 2017 and has served as chapter treasurer since February 2020, also serving as chapter administrator, archivist, secretary of the Diamond Anniversary Committee, and is on the Yearbook and By-Laws/Operating Procedures Committees.

He resides on his great-grandparents' farmstead in Kragnes Township, 10 miles north of Moorhead, Minn., where he was organist of the Oak Mound Congregational Church until its closing in 2011. He now belongs to North Buffalo Lutheran Church and serves as a substitute organist and has subbed for many F-M Area churches since 2008.

He has been active in the Red River Theatre Organ Society for 10 years, currently serves as its treasurer, and is a house organist of the Fargo Theatre on the Mighty Wurlitzer Theatre Pipe Organ.

Composer's Corner

Jacob Ludwig Felix Mendelssohn-Bartholdy Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847)

Portrait of Mendelssohn by Eduard Magnus, 1846

Felix Mendelssohn was a German composer and one of the most gifted and versatile prodigies. He stood at the forefront of German music during the 1830s and 1840s, as conductor, pianos, organist, and above all, composer. His musical style, fully developed before he was 20, drew upon a variety of influences, including the complex chromatic counterpoint of Bach, the formal clarity and gracefulness of Mozart and the dramatic power of Beethoven and Weber.

Mendelssohn's emergence into the first rank of 19th-century German composers coincided with efforts by music historiographers to develop the concept of Classic-Romantic dialect in 18th and 19th-century music. To a large degree, his music reflects a fundamental tension between Classicism and Romanticism in the generation of German composers after Beethoven.

The close study of Bach's music no doubt explains in large measure Mendelssohn's characteristic love of learned counterpoint and complex chromatic part-writing; indeed, the generating of fugues and canons became an avocation for him, in an age where other composers were eschewing the rigor of strict counterpoint.

Mendelssohn was one of the finest organists of his day. The Three Preludes and Fugues, Op. 37, dedicated to Mozart's pupil Thomas Attwood, form a pendant to the Op. 35. The Six Organ Sonatas op. 65 (1845), teeming with artful fugues and chorales, summarize and epitomize Mendelssohn's rediscovery of Bach, and may have inspired Schumann's six fugues on B-A-C-H op. 60.

Six Organ Sonatas, Op. 65 (1845)

Felix Mendelssohn's Six Organ Sonatas, Op. 65, were published in 1845. Eric Werner, a notable biographer and scholar of Mendelssohn has written of them "Next to Bach's works, Mendelssohn's Organ Sonatas belong to the required repertory of all organists." (Werner (1963), 424)

Mendelssohn's frequent excursions from Germany to England presented opportunities for extended improvisations and performances in venues such as St. Paul's Cathedral, London, that were generously received. In 1844, Mendelssohn was commissioned by the London publishing firm of Coventry and Hollier to write three "voluntaries" for organ. Throughout the fall and winter of 1844 and the spring of 1845, Mendelssohn carefully worked and reworked smaller sections of new and existing material into six unified multi-movement works which he termed "sonatas" rather than "voluntaries." Mendelssohn scholar R. Larry Todd explains Mendelssohn's choice of title for his Op. 65 pieces: "By sonata Felix had in mind not the classical paradigm, dependent on sonata form and thematic development, but a conception more familiar to J. S. Bach—a multi-movement instrumental work that might encompass a variety of genres and styles, such as the fugue, toccata, or fantasia." (Todd, 2003,486-487) It is believed that by using a universal term like sonata is what allowed Mendelssohn to publish the collection simultaneously in England, Germany, and Italy.



Beyond Bells & Smells: The Wonder and Power of Christian Liturgy

By Mark Galli

Paraclete Press (ISBN 978-1-55725-521-1), \$16.95.

Beyond Smells & Bells is a short book that appeals to two kinds of people. For those already in liturgical churches, Galli's brief book will either explain to you for the first time how the liturgy intends to form you spiritually or it will renew your love for liturgy. For those not in liturgical churches, Galli's book works as an apologetic for more thoughtful liturgy. Even though a positive apologetic for liturgy is not his intention, Galli's work accomplishes this promotion in an indirect way.



Central Things: Worship in Word and Sacrament

By Gordon W. Lathrop Augsburg Fortress (0-8066-5163-6), \$10.99.

This small book makes a large contribution to the single most important project in the renewal of worship in our time: the Christian assembly refocused on the central things of word and sacrament. With remarkable simplicity and extraordinary insight, Gordon Lathrop unfolds for us here how these central things are about the one thing at the center – Jesus Christ alive among his people for the life of the whole world. Attention to this center clarifies a multitude of urgent matters. (Thomas H. Schattauer)

While this resource is 15 years old, it could be quite helpful as we start to envision our returns to our various churches and corporate worship settings.

ORGAN MUSIC



Partita on Duke Street

Donald Rotermund Concordia Publishing House (976537POD), \$18.00.

Eight stanzas of the Easter hymn, "I Know that My Redeemer Lives," are interpreted in the eight movements of this practical partita. Two, free, and four-voice movements in various styles are present, including an impressionistic sustained-cluster setting for stanza 4. Also includes a free accompaniment and an alternate harmonization.



Partita on Veni Creator Spiritus

Craig Phillips Selah Publishing (160-440), \$12.50.

This set of variations is a technical challenge, but the musical result is superb. One of the appealing factors of these variations is the colorful way in which they use the organ's tonal palette, in combination with Phillips's extraordinary sense of harmony. Each variation presents the cantus firmus in an evocative, colorful manner that is full or rhythmic vitality.



Paschal Suite for Organ and Trumpet

By Richard R. Webster Augsburg (ISBN 978-0-800656-92-8), \$17.00.

Stunning prelude, voluntary, and postlude for Easter! This suite incorporates three Easter tunes (Easter Hymn, Victory, and Gelobt sei Gott) into a Passacaglia, Pastorale, and a Paean to the Risen Christ. *Paschal Suite for Organ and Trumpet* could be of great use during this time of pandemic when and where live choral anthems and congregational song are not an option. Having a solo trumpet could add some flare and exciting to this unusual Easter Sunday and season.



Oxford Hymn Settings for Organists: Easter & Ascension

Ed. Rebecca Groom te Velde and David Blackwell Oxford University Press (ISBN 978-0-193393-46-2), \$31.95

29 fresh, imaginative new pieces on all the major hymn tunes for the season, written by a range of experienced organ composers based in the US and the UK, and displaying a great variety of styles and approaches. This practical, concise settings for all part of the church services are suitable for the busy church musician at the intermediate level working in all major denominations. Some pieces are also suitable for recital use with registration suggestions that can readily be adapted to suit most instruments.
